

This exhibition comprises over 40 artists, all located in the Denver area, who meet once a week for life drawing at the studio of Daniel Sprick. The exhibition will include both paintings and/or sketches from artists including Anna Rose Bain, Mitch Caster, Raj Chaudhuri, Robin Cole, Diego Glazer, Andrea Kemp, Mikael Olson, Daniel Sprick, Jen Starling, Tanner Steed, and Adrienne Stein to name a few.

The Wednesday Group was formed in 1987, the same year as the Art Students League of Denver and met at the studio of Darrell Anderson located on Blake Street. Two of the group's original members, Quang Ho and Starlyn Winger, still attend the weekly life drawing sessions.

Mitch Caster, a member of the Wednesday Group and former exhibitor for The Art Center, stated, "I joined the group in 1989, and it has been hosted at different venues over the years and has evolved over that time. It's now hosted by Daniel Sprick and has over 40 members."

Many of the Wednesday Group's members, including Caster, teach at the Art Students League and others at the Curtis Center for the Arts in Greenwood Village.

Due to the amount of works represented, the exhibition will span the North, Kephart, and Atrium galleries.



As stewards of the Kephart Collection, it is our pleasure at TAC to continue to have the opportunity to exhibit the paintings, pastels, and mixed media works of such a talented and respected artist from our community.

Since the architecture and design of the Gallery was imagined as a home for Kephart works, the Gallery is at its most beautiful when filled with his creations.

In Kephart's time at Mesa State College, he explored experimental compositions, but it was his proclivity for representation that led him to a deep appreciation for landscapes. While he is most known for his abstract compositions, it wasn't until the 1990s that he became serious about nonrepresentation in his work.

This exhibition will showcase the representational and nonrepresentational works of Jac Kephart. He was a multifaceted artist working in a variety of mediums and styles; there is a throughline that can be seen in his entire body of work – one that unifies his style as a complete artist.

Collage and assemblage artists gather all kinds of things to make their art. Different papers, items to make texture, found objects, vintage postcards and ephemera, magazines, and a myriad of other things. But in the end, it all must be assembled to create a cohesive work. An artist can gather hundreds of interesting things, but, ultimately, the artist wants to put them together to create a story, a piece of art that will draw the viewer in and create a feeling that moves the viewer. This is just as it is with any other art form.

In this annual exhibit, "Some Assembly Required," each artist has produced up to three works that they have coordinated through color, material, texture, theme, and/or composition. This exhibit will have a variety of artistic styles that range from realistic to abstract to everything

The exhibit will run May 13 through June 28. Come on Friday, June 6, to hear the juror speak about their impressions of the exhibit and talk with artists.

The Rocky Mountain Collage Society (RMCS) started in 2007 and is a group of artists from around Colorado who provide education and encourage the understanding of collage as a fine art form. The RMCS holds quarterly meetings that include demos on collage techniques and sharing about what is happening in the collage community. Along with their annual exhibit, they periodically have workshops free "Collage Days" for their members. The annual membership is \$35. 


